

What about legal assistance?

VJOs specialize in extending healthcare and resources to veterans and are **not** qualified or able to offer legal services.

By law, the program does not attempt to influence criminal justice outcomes (including decisions made by a judge) or represent veterans as only an attorney can. The VA also can't accept "custody" of veterans.

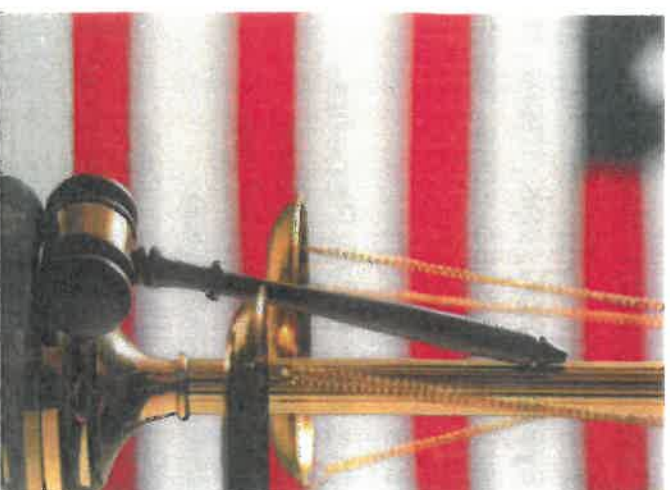

What is Veterans Justice Outreach (VJO)?

It's a VA program designed to identify eligible veterans in the legal system and link them to treatment and resources such as:

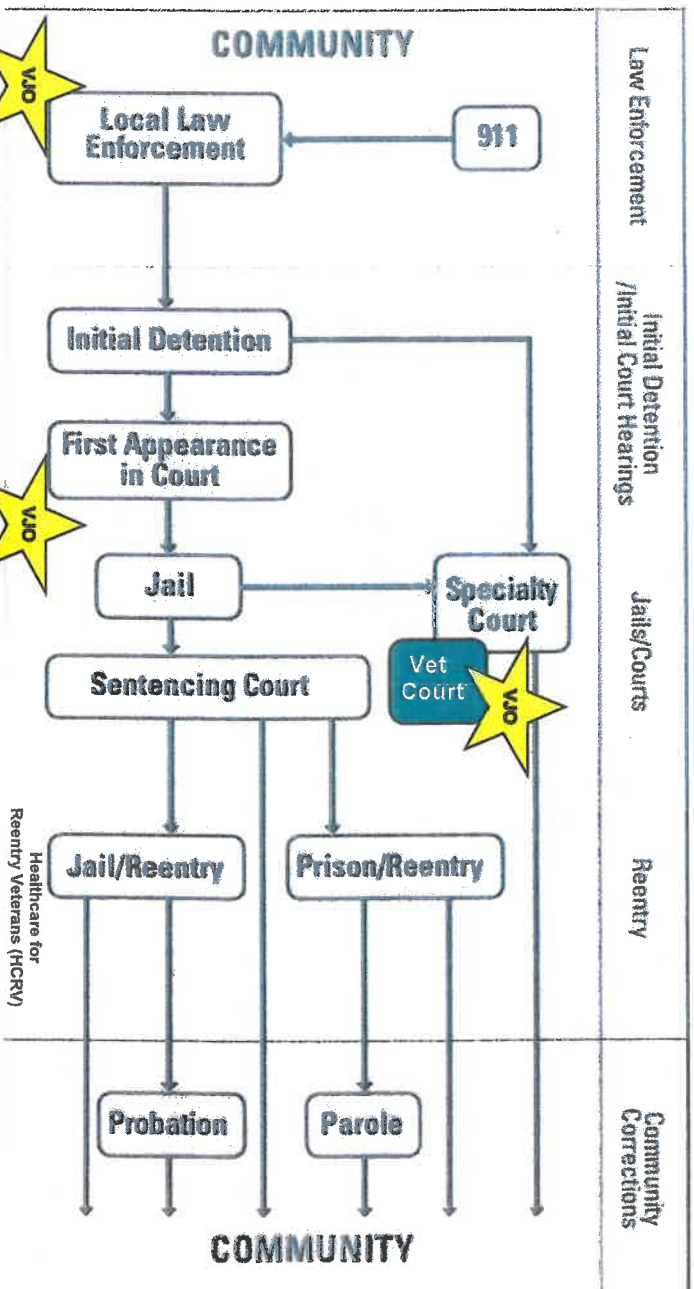
- Connecting to VA Benefits
- Access to Medical Care
- Treating Substance Use
- Housing Assistance
- Mental Health Services
- Recovery support

As a partner in the VA homeless prevention efforts, VJO program goals are to:

- Prevent homelessness
- Support recovery and re-adjustment to community life
- Empower veterans to end contact with the legal system by breaking the cycle of re-arrest and incarceration.



When do VJOs help?



VJOs serve veterans at multiple points within the legal system. VA staff maintain positive relationships with law enforcement and community partners to educate and share resources for veterans.

How are courts involved?

VJO staff work with courts to help justice-involved veterans get mental health assessments, treatment planning, and needed referrals to VA services. VJOs support veteran treatment court initiatives and train community partners to better understand and act on veteran issues.
